Our Theichere

Representatives from congregations across North America come together once every two years with pastors and church leaders in a General Church Conference, the highest governing body of the Brethren in Christ denomination.

Between meetings, the work of the General Church Conference is carried on by the Leadership Council under the direction of the Moderator and General Secretary with accountability to the General Conference Board, comprised of a member from each of the regional conferences and from each of the general church's ministry boards.

The Brethren in Christ Church in North America is divided into eight regional conferences. Each conference is led by a Bishop and has an annual meeting to conduct business and to promote fellowship.






Congregational Health

Even as the Brethren in Christ grow at a fast pace because

of new church plants, we continue to give attention to existing churches, current ministries, and familiar faces. Our Bishops work toward the health and development of the churches entrusted to their care. In every conference, Bishops help their teams of leaders concentrate on training, resourcing, and encouraging each congregation. They provide consultative services to pastors and congregations. They direct in the evaluation and selection of pastors. They mobilize pastors and other conference leaders for mutual support and cooperative work among clusters of congregations and regional areas.

Brethren in Christ World Missions mobilizes the church for global witness and service especially among the 2 billion people of our world who have little or no knowledge of Christ.

Our aim is to see...

-a church for every people,
-the gospel for every person, and
-Jesus worshiped in the nations.

The Brethren in Christ have been engaged in overseas missions over 100 years. Over this time the church has grown to 65,000 members in over 1000 congregations in 23 countries outside North America.









Every year we invest over \$2 million in overseas missions, with about 65 percent of these funds made available through Brethren in Christ congregations in North America. Other sources include individual giving, bequests, and projects.

God is calling a growing number of our young men and women to cross-cultural ministry. We provide discipleship training and service opportunities for youth and young adults through short-term ministry trips and training centers in Honduras, the Bronx, and London where the focus is on ministry to Muslims

In compassionate response to human need, we partner with the World Hunger Fund and Mennonite Central Committee. We minister to medical needs in Jesus' name in three locations in Africa, one of which hosts innovative research to alleviate the scourge of malaria.

Through personal contacts, events, and media, we share mission vision, stories, and resources to inform and help inspire our congregations to more fully participate in the Great Commission.

At this time we are mobilized to launch church planting movements among...

- ...the 20 million Isaan people in Thailand who are 99% Buddhist:
- ...the largest Native-American group in the US—the Navajo, and
- ...among the largest least-evangelized group in North America—the 6.5 million French-speaking people of Quebec.

All this has developed as God touched the hearts of senders and goers from the local congregations in North America.

Our Héritage

or more than 200 years, the Brethren in Christ have expressed a meaningful understanding of walking in relationship with Jesus. The Brethren in Christ are a blend of three renewal movements within the Christian faith.

Our roots trace back to the Protestant Reformation. At that time, numerous reformers stressed the authority of Scripture and personal faith in Christ. In this light, some became convinced of their personal need not only for rededication of their lives to Christ, but also of their personal responsibility to be rebaptized as a believer. This conviction provoked sharp opposition from the established church of the state, resulting in the deaths of many who stood against the traditions of an all-too-political form of Christianity.

Anabaptists stressed the importance not only of a personal responsibility toward one's baptism (believer's baptism), but also the importance of discipleship and obedience, the separation of church and state, the practice of non-resistance, and the necessity of community. Fleeing persecution from the established church, many Anabaptists fled to North America.

About one hundred years later, the Pietistic Revival movement stirred renewal among European Protestants. The Pietists stressed the importance of genuine conversion and a warm personal experience of renewed life in Christ. This awakening experience swept through Europe and on to America.


At about the same time, John Wesley inspired a renewal movement in England. The Wesley brothers experienced the heart-felt faith of the Pietists that led to an awakening throughout England and, ultimately, to the Wesleyan movement in America. This movement has come to be known as the Holiness movement – emphasizing conversion as a conscious acceptance of God, the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, and daily growth in holiness.

What began in the 1750's in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, has since been spreading throughout North America and, through an overwhelming receptivity of our missionaries, throughout the world.

Having no aversion to participating in what God is doing around them, the

is doing around them, the
Brethren in Christ Church began connecting
with other evangelical associations that seemed
interested in the similar evangelical pursuits
as themselves. By the 1950's, the Brethren
in Christ joined the National Association
of Evangelicals, an association that has
somewhat muted our Anabaptist heritage
- while at the same time, has caused us to
think deeply and evaluate our convictions and
core values, a very positive challenge to us all.

the BIC Church in North America is comprised of around 300 congregations. Worldwide there are now a total of more than 1200 churches. Currently, our single-largest initiative is planting new churches. Undoubtedly, reaching beyond comfort zones is difficult, but along the journey, the Brethren in Christ are, once again, being very open to where God is leading.

inspired Word of God and the final authority for faith and practice.

We believe that the Scriptures reveal the triune God whose person, nature, and character forever is God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. God is the source and foundation of all that is. God has established order and relationships within creation.

We believe that God created man and woman in His image. Because human beings chose to disobey God, their nature became sinful, resulting in alienation from God, from one another, from themselves, and from the rest of creation.

We believe that Jesus Christ, God's Son, came to earth to reveal the Father and to provide God's only plan of salvation for sinful humanity. New life in Christ is given to all who turn from evil through faith in the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit enables the believer to make full surrender to the work of Christ and to walk in the fullness of the Spirit's power.
